Director, Special Projects, Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Science, Boston Children's Hospital

Kim Alleyne, MCP, EdD, has over 20 years of experience leading training and community building initiatives. She has held leadership roles in early childhood, youth development and corporate philanthropy. She serves as the director of special projects at Boston Children's Hospital, Department of Psychiatry. There, Dr. Alleyne has been excited to be part of a team launching an early childhood mental health program.
